- 11. This lovely lady is a beloved author, and although never married, she wrote brilliantly on love and loss in England. She completed six novels. A favorite quote of hers: "What are men compared to rocks and trees?" Jane Austen
- 12. She was Chancellor of The College of William & Mary, after serving as the first woman on the Supreme Court. She was also inducted into the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Sandra Day O'Connor
- 13. Our very own Okie Olympian. This fierce female is the most decorated US gymnast, and a member of the Magnificent Seven the US Women's Olympic Gymnastics team who won team gold in the 1996 Olympics. **Shannon Miller**

- 14. As we were wisely reminded in Princess Diaries, ""No one can make you feel inferior without your consent." This lady was the niece of a president, and wife to one (her fifth cousin, once removed)! She was the US Delegate to the UN General Assembly from 1945-1952. **Eleanor Roosevelt**

- 17. She is an advocate for mental health care, addiction care, the elderly, and education. She is a fashion icon, famously donning a FANTASTIC Alexander McQueen gown. She is mom to two darling heirs to the thrones. **Princess Katherine, Duchess of Cambridge**
- 18. She has a doctorate in physical chemistry, and in 2005, was appointed the first woman chancellor of Germany. In 2007, she was the president of the European Council, and basically runs Europe.
